# The time has come for American Bonsai.

The Artisans Cup exists to showcase Bonsai as a true art form. We're starting a movement to reveal the beauty of the ongoing collaboration between humans and nature that occurs during the process of training a tree. This process, currently experiencing surging growth in North America, is symbolic of the struggle for life in which all living things take part, and highlights the similarities and differences between people and trees. It is a poignant representation of life itself, with all of its challenges and successes, its hardship and joy.



#### MOVING BONSAI FORWARD

American Bonsai respects the rich history and tradition of Bonsai, while challenging the norm and pushing the boundaries of what's possible.

### **Material**

Bonsai has always been a collaboration between people and local natural resources. In recent years the drama of naturally stunted trees collected from the harsh conditions of America's mountains, deserts, and coastlines has opened new doors in the art. The wildness of American material speaks to the freedom of American culture and offers a unique opportunity to expand the palette of material used in American Bonsai.



3 — The Art Form

### Form

Bonsai can take many forms. From a straight upright specimen to a cascading tree that drops below the rim of the container, the form a tree takes represents the environment from which it came. Although tradition still holds a place in the foundation for bonsai, the modern American aesthetic deviates from traditional, symmetrical Bonsai. It instead captures more of the unbridled, natural form of the tree as it appears in the wild through asymmetry and dynamic movement.



### **Supporting Elements**

Critical to any world-class Bonsai are the ceramics, woodwork, tools, and other supporting elements. American Bonsai supports local artisans and craftsmen who are doing exceptional work in these areas.

While we are passionate about celebrating this bold new expression of the millenia-old tradition of Bonsai, The Artisans Cup will exhibit a wide variety of tree species and design aesthetics, provided they show care and artistry.



ARTIST STATEMENT EXCERPT: This collected hemlock shows how the harsh realities of snow burden and spring melt molded mother and daughter, first separate, into a unified composition of curves that would take us a hundred years to artificially produce. The dark, bluish-green hue of the needles suggests a mountain coolness that is reflected in the color of the pot. The feminine lines of the pot, and the smooth bends of the stand harmonize with the gentle curves of the tree. The companion plant is also a mountain dweller.

ARTIST STATEMENT EXCERPT: I collected this tree in December of 2005 from the base of a granite cliff in Southeastern Arizona. Each winter, the snow and ice from the cornice created by the cliff would fall against one side and the base of the trunk, which created the incredible shari that is the finest feature of this bonsai. The tree was found growing in an upright style and was turned 180 degreees into a cascade style to showcase the amazing deadwood.

ARTIST STATEMENT EXCERPT: Growing up in central California, I had a friend who lived on a winery whose two-mile driveway was lined with pomegranate and olive trees. The trees were decades old and many showed it, with their twisted hollow trunks and withering branches. Although they may have appeared as just old trees to some, they were majestic and beautiful to me. Each tree had a style and structure that was unique. Every year, as fall would come, I anticipated their golden leaves and bright red fruit. In styling this tree, I wished to evoke the same majestic impression of those pomegranate trees from my youth.

ARTIST STATEMENT EXCERPT: This tree, kindly called "President Hoover," was conceived by accident and adventure. While Nick Lenz and I were poking around in a field-side dump, we found the old vacuum cleaner. Back at my garden, we carefully planted an old, skinny larch in its bowels. Years passed, deadwood was embedded and angles were tweaked. The tall tree's thin trunk iterates the Hoover's handle. Its decrepity, pairing with that of the device, foreshadows our future doom under the weight of technology.

ARTIST STATEMENT EXCERPT: At first glance, my submission for the Artisans Cup doesn't scream "American Bonsai." The main tree, a Korean hornbeam, is a collected specimen from Korea. The second tree is a popular species for bonsai - Japanese black pine. That said, the composition owes as much to the U.S. as it does to Japan. My starting point for the hornbeam was a trunk. I developed the branches over the past 10 years. My starting point for the pine was a seed. I didn't know much about bonsai at the time, but I had a passion for growing

plants and a love of pines. The tree is now 21 years old. The methods used to develop these trees are heavily influenced by Japanese techniques, but I owe the bulk of my knowledge to U.S. bonsai teachers. My aim in styling these trees is to bring out the characteristics that make pine and hornbeam popular varieties for bonsai - interesting trunk and surface roots, fine branching and the ability to develop foliage that is in scale with the tree.

ARTIST STATEMENT EXCERPT: This tree was collected in south Florida in the early 80's by Joe Samuels, one of the early pioneers of bonsai in Florida. In my humble opinion, it is by far one of the





best representations of the larger buttonwoods that reside on the rocky islands of the Florida Keys that I have seen, and is one the oldest collected specimens that I have encountered. Some of the trees I find most inspiring stand alone on small coral rock islands off the coast in the Atlantic ocean. They show a true will to survive in the face of adversity, overcoming the lack of a constant fresh water supply. Only to be replenished when a rain shower passes through saturating the stone in which they live. Gripping the coral tightly over the centuries as hurricanes push through, threatening to rip them away from their rocky perch, and still they hold on. They are inundated with salt day after day, and have adapted to excrete the excess through specialized glands at the base of their leaves. Living on the ragged edge of life and death, they exude strength and beauty while sharing the story of their constant struggle through the scars that they have earned. It is my hope to capture this image, if only a glimpse, and to allow the viewer to see this species in all it's glory as I have kayaking the ocean waters.

ARTIST STATEMENT EXCERPT: This olive was donated to The Huntington in March 1995 by John Yoshio Naka, considered to be the Father of American Bonsai and the person credited with introducing this ancient art to most of the western world. John collected this tree from an olive orchard in Fontana, California, in 1958. He designed the tree and developed it until he presented it to The Huntington in the 1990s. Beyond that lineage, this tree is significant in it's age. Estimated to be over 120 years old, what comprises the tree is most likely secondary basal sprout growth that was able to gain dominance

over the original tree, which was lost due to unknown causes. The weathered core of the original trunk, highlighted by the remnants of many concentric rings, is clearly visible from the front and framed by old rolled bark which bears a fine rugged texture throughout that also indicates the length of time in training, which is ancient for an American Bonsai.



I extracted it from a perfect pocket, ensuring its survival. The gnarly trunk was compressed early in it life by heavy maritime snow. I exposed one layered root and left it as a jin. I designed the overall tree by honoring the natural trunk-line. I arranged the foliage to frame that value and to increase the gnarly-ness of the distal branches to mimic the artistry of the convoluted trunk. It is an unusual cascade. in that the majority of the appreciation is delivered by the lift of the trunk rather
